Art education is essential and helps create thinkers. And, especially in River Valley, we all appreciate locally how art influences the economy, mental health and wellness, and community culture. The River Valley School District is very fortunate to have well-rounded courses and experiences for our students. These classes, and their instructors, help students love and connect to their deep interests in the arts.

This week we celebrate the arts. Passed by Congress in 2010, House Resolution 275 designated the week beginning with the second Sunday in September as “**National Arts in Education Week.**” During this week, the field of arts education joins together in communities across the country to tell the story of the impact of the transformative power of the arts in education. The National Art Education Association (NAEA) believes there is a symbiotic relationship between a supported high-quality visual arts education program and a positive school culture. The fundamental context for a school-based visual arts education program requires effective educators who are adept in art, but also adept in leadership, equity, budgeting, time management, instructional materials, cross-curricular connections and online resources. They become a master of all. But more specifically, the art educators play an important leadership role in building positive school culture and climate (arteducators.org).

The Wisconsin Arts Board—a state agency which recently celebrated 50 years of advocacy for the arts—also recognizes the influence of art education as it builds community and economic development. Locally, the River Valley ARTS organization nourishes the creative spirit in our community with financial support for artists, as well as arts and cultural organizations, which ultimately affects our students and community. RV ARTS embraces the performing arts, literary arts, and visual arts and crafts, as well as local and regional history and culture. In addition, the Spring Green Arts and Crafts Fair continues the great tradition of celebrating the arts annually with exhibitors celebrating many forms of media. This coalition in our community takes the energy from thousands of visitors and graciously extends their support with scholarships for students from our district. They all advocate and organize for our families.

Pablo Picasso stated, “Every child is an artist. The problem is how to remain an artist once we grow up.” This week, find a moment to enjoy art and some moments of creativity.
